## Jacquie Gering ~ “Modern Quilting: You’ll Know It When You See It” October 11, 2016



Are you curious to learn what the buzz is all about with modern quilts? And what is “Modern Quilting” anyway? Join us the evening of October 11<sup>th</sup> to welcome Jacquie Gering, one of the leaders of the modern quilting movement and the National Modern Quilt Guild.

Jacquie will share her definition of Modern Quilting and directly address some of the misunderstandings and questions about the modern aesthetic. So bring your curiosity and your questions! As always, the best way to understand anything about modern quilts is by seeing examples and Jacquie will provide an extensive trunk show, explaining what makes the quilts modern or not.

To those that are not familiar with Jacquie’s work, it will become evident that she is a passionate modern quilt designer, enthusiastic maker, phenomenal lecturer and fantastic teacher. She is known for her innovative “out of the box” designs, striking message quilts and unique style. Co-author of *Quilting Modern: Techniques and Projects for Improvisational Quilts*, Jacquie is also a contributing designer and author for *Stitch*, *Modern Patchwork*, *Quilter’s World* and *Quilter’s Quarterly* magazines. Her quilts have been featured in many national and international publications. In 2014, the International Association of Creative Arts Professionals named her Quilt Teacher of the Year. Jacquie lives in Kansas City and shares her quilting knowledge on her popular blog, Tallgrass Prairie Studio.

Earlier in the day, prior to Jacquie’s lecture with the Guild on October 11<sup>th</sup>, we have asked Jacquie to teach her workshop, **Creative Quilting with the Walking Foot**, from 8am to 3pm. The location of the workshop is yet to be determined.

Sandra is known to value precision in her quilt making, while able to finish quilts quickly and with ease. Sandra's quilting style draws on antique quilts with a fresh and modern flare as she plays with size, color and fabric choices. Sandra is an up-and-coming quilter, quilt pattern designer, surface pattern designer, and author. She is author of the book *Scrap Patchwork: Traditionally Modern Quilts*, and her quilts have been featured in many magazines, such as *Quiltmaker*, *McCall's Quilting*, *American Patchwork*, *Modern Quilts Unlimited*, and more. Sandra has written and published over 50+ individual quilt patterns. Her first fabric collection is due fall 2016 for Michael Miller Fabrics. Sandra has been a quilter since 2004, when her husband took her back to his parent's home, where she witnessed the beauty and love of quilts cherished by his family. She quickly began quilting and learned among a community of quilters. She learned from reading books, taking classes at her local quilt shop, and joining local guilds.

Sandra spent her early career as an auditor in public accounting and continues to work in the financial services industry. Her attention to detail, workmanship, and descriptive instructions transcends from her auditing experience. What some Guild members don't know is that during the course of six months, Sandra wrote her first quilt book and designed, prepared and quilted 14 quilts for her publisher, while still working as a full-time mother, dedicated wife and Director of Internal Audit at her company in Denver. It is evident that Sandra's discipline and passion for quilting allow her to move mountains as she is willing to work long hours to get her work completed within schedule constraints and still maintain a peaceful, beautiful home life.

So come celebrate Sandra's success and shop at her "pop-up shop" at the meeting as she'll have available fabrics from her stash, independent quilt patterns, and her new book, *Scrap Patchwork*, available for purchase.

# UPCOMING EVENT

## Creative Quilting With a Walking Foot

**Instructor:** Jacquie Gering; **Website:** [www.tallgrassprairiestudio.blogspot.com](http://www.tallgrassprairiestudio.blogspot.com)

**Date:** October 11, 2016

### **Class Description:**

Want to quilt your quilts on your home machine and maybe free motion quilting isn't for you? Come discover the joy and creative possibilities of quilting with your walking foot. Straight-line quilting has a long history and is making a comeback in both modern and traditional quilts. Learn tips and tricks for successful quilting with your walking foot along with creative quilting designs that can be accomplished on your home machine.



### **Materials List**

Sewing machine with walking foot or dual feed. Please make sure your machine is clean, oiled and in good working order with a fresh needle installed.

An extension table is highly recommended, but not required. (To learn decorative stitch quilting with the walking foot, bring your electronic machine rather than your mechanical machine if you have one.) (If using a dual feed, please bring all the feet that work with the dual feed)

Sewing machine manual

Pillow or chair pad to help us be at the right height for quilting. Chairs at workshop venues can be very low. (Recommended)

Extra sewing machine needles for quilting

Thread for quilting (I recommend 50 weight aurifil thread in both the top and bobbin). Thread that contrasts with your practice sandwiches will help you see your quilting stitches better while practicing.

Painter's tape – 1 roll approximately 1" wide

Quilting gloves (optional)

Hem gage

6" x 24" acrylic ruler

Fabric safe marker

Sketchbook or notebook and pencil

(5) 12" x 18" prepared quilt sandwiches for practice (top, batting, and backing)

(2) 24" x 24" prepared quilt sandwiches for practice (top, batting, and backing)

Practice tops should be whole cloth and solid fabrics. I recommend low loft cotton batting. You can pin baste or spray baste your prepared quilt sandwiches but they need to be basted and ready to quilt. Spray basted quilt sandwiches will be easier to mark.

Optional but recommended:

1 finished quilt top (We'll use this top to talk together about how to quilt our quilts with designs we can accomplish with our walking foot.)

This is the time to showcase quilts made by our members. Each member may enter up to three quilts. Quilts must be pre-registered by September 15th, registration is on the Guild's website. All quilts need an attached sleeve and each must be in a separate bag (no plastic). Don't forget to e-mail a photo of the quilt to Dawn. Quilts will be collected at the October 11th meeting beginning at 6 pm.



Voting will once again be favorites by the viewing public so don't be afraid to enter. The categories are listed on the website and on page 5 of this newsletter.

As this is a members show we need everyone to volunteer. Thursday evening we will set up the racks. We need four pick-up trucks to bring the racks from the storage unit across the street. Then the racks need to be assembled and put up. Lots of hands make quick work.

Friday morning the quilts will be hung and we need more volunteers so the show will be ready for the 1 pm opening.

During the show, we need more volunteers to work the entry table, boutique, white glove walkers, and Guild table.

And of course, more volunteers are needed for take-down on Saturday at 5 pm. No quilts are released for pick-up until all the quilts are down. This eliminates confusion. The racks also come down and we need four trucks to take them back to their home in the storage unit.

The quilt show doesn't happen without you and others. See or call Mary Ann Watson to volunteer and sign up today.

Some of the highlights of the show will be the Bee Sew Brave quilts and the bedturnings with Jeanne Wright. The bedturnings are scheduled for 6:30pm Friday evening and 11am and 2pm Saturday. We will have several vendors for your shopping needs along with our wonderful Unique Boutique. And don't forget the 125+ quilts. See you there.



# 2016 Quilt Show Categories for Viewer's Choice

Hopefully all of you have been busy getting your quilt ready for our upcoming Quilt Show. I will give you a hint: It's in October and online registration will open July 15th! Yes, I said July 15th!!! Please don't panic, the Quilt Show isn't until October, and you do have until September 13th to get your quilt finished and submitted for the show. The Quilt Show will be on Friday, October 14, from 1pm to 8pm and on Saturday, October 15, from 9am to 5pm. The categories are again listed below so get busy and HAPPY QUILTING!!!

1. Applique - Quilt top made by applying fabric onto a background, any method. The quilt may be hand or machine quilted. All sizes of quilts are included.
2. Art: Abstract/Three-Dimensional - Quilt illustrates original design, innovation, or progressive techniques. All sizes are included in this category.
3. Art: Pictorial/Nature - Quilt illustrates original design, innovation, or progressive techniques. All sizes are included in this category.
4. Art: People/Animal - Quilt illustrates original design, innovation, or progressive techniques. All sizes are included in this category.
5. Challenge - Quilt made for the Longmont Quilt Guild challenges issued to the members. Mystery challenge quilts may be top-only; other challenge quilts must be finished.
6. Hand Quilted/Hand-made - Quilts must be quilted using hand stitching. This category also includes traditional hand-made tops such as YoYo's or Cathedral Windows. All sizes of quilts are included in this category.
7. Junior/Novice - This entrant is under 18 years of age; or if older than 18 years, this is your first, second, or third quilt. If older than 18 years of age, you may enter this category only once. All sizes of quilts are included using any method/technique.
8. Machine Pieced/Machine Quilted Small - A whole cloth or pieced quilt made by sewing machine (home, mid-arm, or long-arm). Quilt size 60" or less in width and 60" or less in length (perimeter is 240" or less).
9. Machine Pieced/Machine Quilted Large Made by a Single Person - A whole cloth or pieced quilt made by sewing machine (home, mid-arm, or long-arm) constructed solely by a single person. Quilt size is over 60" in width and over 60" in length (perimeter is greater than 240").
10. Machine Pieced/Machine Quilted Large Made by Two or More People - A whole cloth or pieced quilt made by sewing machine (home, mid-arm, or long-arm) which was constructed, quilted, or worked on by two or more people. Quilt size is over 60" in width and 60" in length (perimeter is greater than 240").
11. Mixed Technique - Traditional quilt made using multiple techniques. All sizes of quilts are included in this category.
12. Themed - Quilt design and/or fabrics represent a theme such as children, holiday, patriotic/Quilts of Valor, etc. All sizes of quilts are included using any method/technique.



## Raffle Quilt News



## SAYING THANK YOU TO HEROES

How do you thank someone who has risked their life for you? Somehow, words just don't seem adequate, so people may look for other options. Members of the Longmont Quilt Guild's "Bee Sew Brave" (BSB) group have found one way. They use their talents to create patriotic quilts that honor military personnel who have been injured while serving our country. It's the group's way of saying "thank you" to the brave men and women who put their lives on the line to protect us.

BSB is a group of approximately 20 quilters of all skill levels, coming together for a shared purpose. Members work both independently and as a group to make quilts using patriotic-themed fabrics, that are presented to returning heroes. BSB members meet monthly to update each other on their quilting progress, to share ideas, and to plan for future events.

Once the quilts are finished, most are donated to the Quilts of Valor Foundation, a national program whose purpose is "to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor." BSB works specifically with the Northern Colorado Chapter of the QOV Foundation which distributes the quilts to recipients within the State of Colorado.



Three years ago the BSB group also began a partnership with the Challenge Aspen Military Outreach (CAMO) program, that provides "professional adaptive instruction for military personnel who have been diagnosed with cognitive and/or physical disabilities." Each February CAMO sponsors the "Estes Park Nordic Ski & Snowshoe Adventure," a week of outdoor sports and wellness sessions. At the end of the week, BSB members travel to Estes Park to present each retreat participant with a keepsake patriotic quilt, made especially for them. The presentations are an emotional experience for everyone involved, a chance to touch each others' lives in a very special and personal way.

This year BSB members decided to try something new. They challenged each other to create patriotic quilts that include one common fabric (white stars on a red background). Each member's design is unique, but every quilt features that specific fabric somewhere in it. And the results are very impressive!

The BSB challenge quilts will be on display during the Longmont Quilt Guild's Fantabulous Quilt Shop With Boutique, Friday, October 14, 1:00 - 8:00 p.m. and Saturday, October 15, 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. in Barn A of the Boulder County Fairgrounds in Longmont.

In addition to the patriotic quilts, the Quilt Show will feature over 100 other quilts made by Longmont Quilt Guild members; a boutique of quilts and handcrafted items for sale; an exhibit of antique quilts narrated by noted quilt historian Jeananne Wright; vendor booths; and much more! Admission to the Quilt Show is \$5; children under 12 are free; there is no charge to shop in the Boutique. 



